# RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

# Greetings!

Spring is in full swing and the birds are waking me up with their song every morning. As I write this, I'm conscious of how every spring surprises me with its freshness and beauty that touches all my senses.

Kicking off our month of May is our annual YOUTH SERVICE. Our young people are diligently and enthusiastically working on a service for you, that will be presented May 6. Please come and be pushed more deeply into thoughtful introspection and support our youth in their vulnerability in sharing with you.

After the service, the youth will continue with their Popcorn Theology topics through May 30.

Our first Sunday RE class introduces our seventh Unitarian Universalist Principle, respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part, through the story of British Unitarian Beatrix Potter. The creator of Peter Rabbit not only wrote and illustrated children's books featuring animal characters, but also related to nature as a dedicated amateur biologist, a professional farmer and the donor of many acres of countryside to England 's National Trust. In this session, the children identify connections that form the interdependent web of an ecosystem and explore their own relationship with the natural world. We add the signpost "Honor Life" to our Faithful Journeys Path.

On the third Sunday, our session concludes the Faithful Journeys program. The children use a game to review the Unitarian Universalist Principles they have explored in previous sessions. Rather than a story from UU history or contemporary life, children will hear personal stories of acting in faith told by youth or adult members of their own congregation.

The children revisit the Faithful Journeys Path they have created together and affirm actions and choices they have described in their Faithful Footprints.

And that concludes this year's RE program! It has been a wonderful, growth-full and successful year in both RE and Youth Group. Thank you for everyone's support that was necessary to make this flow so well.





# **CUUF BOARD UPDATE**

Board Update for April 2018

On Tuesday, April 10th the Board met and decided to direct the Architectural Task Force to work with the architect on a building plan based on the Feasibility study's projected capital campaign amount. In other words, we felt you should see a scaled back building plan. We will continue to explore alternative spaces with the realtor and talking with other churches.

At the time of our meeting a third of our pledge goal had been received. Thank you for your support. If you have not turned in your pledge for next year, please consider doing so soon.

We selected delegates for the Pacific Northwest District's annual meeting in Portland. Thank you, Anita Janis. Reverend Laura and Jeff Lau.

To remain in compliance with our Bylaws while completing the transition from a nine to a sevenmember board, Christina volunteered to resign at the end of June, one year short of her three-year term. It wasn't easy, but a chart, some of my grandchildren's toys and a great deal of discussion convinced us this needed to happen. Next time you visit with Christina please thank her for her service and ask how a few golf balls inspired this sacrifice.

We cover a lot of ground at our board meetings, such as our decision to pursue a replacement note for the north lot with Washington Trust Bank. Unfortunately, this small summary cannot convey all the issues we dealt with at this or any of our meetings. # MISSION MOMENT

Recently, the Board of Trustees voted to approve CUUF acting as the nonprofit umbrella agency for Hand in Hand Immigration Services while they are seeking their own independent Federal Nonprofit status. CUUF is proud to assist this organization that has helped educate and empower over 800 people to become U.S. citizens. Hand in Hand Immigration is an excellent role model for our own mission to "Seek, Embrace, Serve," providing critical support to people who are going through the legally complicated, misunderstood, and emotional process to becoming a citizen of this country. Program Director Norma Gallegos, two staff members and 40 volunteers provide legal services, education, and outreach for people in Wenatchee and the surrounding communities who are on their journey to United States citizenship. People are helped by receiving up to date information about the laws, attending ESL classes, getting assistance with legal paperwork, participating in free citizenship classes in English and Spanish, and receiving encouraging support throughout the process. This is a low-cost program and no client will be denied services because of an inability to pay. Hand in Hand offers volunteer opportunities and is encouraging CUUF members and friends to learn about their important work. # The Wizard Behind the Curtain By Sharon Meho Petit, Sensei and Todd Daiko Petit

In *The Wizard of Oz* the great wizard that Dorothy, the Cowardly Lion, the Tinman and the Strawman are seeking turns out to be just a man behind a curtain. When he is exposed, the source of the magic is revealed. That source is in Dorothy, the Lion, the Tinman and the Strawman. The Lion finds his courage, the Tin Man turns out to have a heart and Strawman finds he always had a brain. Dorothy finds that home is with her even during her great Yellow Brick Road adventure.



This seems to me to be what it is like to Wake Up in Zen. The teacher is just the kindly person who makes sure everything is ready for meditation practice, keeps you sitting by doing dharma talks and makes sure the bell and drum call you to chant. The real wisdom lies in your own Heart-Mind or *Shin*. The teacher can't give wisdom/compassion/enlightenment to you or take away your suffering. In the end that is your job. You are the one who must practice sitting in meditation, watching your mind invent the facade you label *you*. It is up to you to practice with the koans (practice questions) that are designed to allow you to drop the *thinking mind* and see directly the wisdom passed down for over 2500 years from the Buddha.

Reading a book is not going to do it. The old masters tell us to burn our books if you can't stop relying on them. Everyday life is Zen and the only way to realize *It* is to let go of all the speculation, memorization and classification. Stop arguing with yourself and others about the *Truth*. Just sit with your knees hurting, watching your mind spin, not judging until you can just drop it. In that spaciousness is true freedom and wisdom. Yet, as Genjo says, don't literally burn the books, since those of us who aren't there yet might find them useful.

But like the wizard in Alice, your *True Face Before Your Parents Were Born* can only be revealed by ripping away the curtain of delusion that you call *yourself*.




# Unitarian Universalism

- \* The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- \* The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- \* Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

# Unitarian Universalism draws from many sources:

- \* Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- \* Words and deeds of prophetic women and men which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- \* Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- \* Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- \* Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit.
