

Choose to Bless the World

A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD PRESIDENT

Dear Friends.

"A brave leader is not someone who is armed with all the answers." ~Brené Brown, Dare to Lead

As the first born child (and only female sibling) in my family I often ponder whether it was by nature or birth order I have always felt I was born to lead. (Or, if you ask my younger brothers, I was born to be in charge.) Yet, being the first born with no big sibling to teach me, I've found myself doubting my knowledge and skills at times. I'm often willing to take the lead on something, then quickly find myself looking for the rule-book that will arm me with the answers that I need in order to do the job *perfectly* (the



discussion of perfection is reserved for another time). All too quickly I've learned there is rarely such a rule-book available.

This past month our CUUF Treasurer Luke Evans and myself attended the Pacific West Region (PWR) Leadership Experience. This retreat was offered by some of our PWR staff and is a new pilot that is an updated version of the previous Russel Lockwood Leadership School previous CUUF board members and congregational members have attended. Luke and I enjoyed a weekend intensive retreat with approximately 20 other congregational members from around the region. There was a diverse representation of leaders from every congregational size, congregational age, and history of experience that we both learned from. We will be participating in bi-weekly group conversations over the next few weeks as the shared learning experience continues into the Spring. We both look forward to bringing our newly gained tools to our work as leaders on the team.

I am grateful for the opportunity to have spent the time with other UU's and to learn all that I could through deep listening and sharing. While I still did not find a rulebook that is filled with the answers I was looking for, I found comfort in realizing I don't need one. Our faith does not have a rulebook and our democratic process, through our group's collective conscience, is one of the endearing qualities that drew me here. Without the book of answers, I am still your *brave* leader.

CUUF Ministerial Intern Update

Our CUUF Intern Minister Joel Courtney has been busy this past two months. He spent three weeks (one week for each class he took) in Chicago at Meadville Lombard Theological School doing the in-person part of his UU seminary classes. In the Winter semester, Joel took three classes – Liberal Theology, World Religions and Religious Education for a Changing World, which was taught by Rev. Tandi Rogers, who is on the UUA Pacific Western Regional Congregational Life Staff. Joel said that he was most impressed with the class on RE. Joel called it – "a true master class."

While Joel is here with us, he connects with his professors and classmates online to complete assignments and group work. In March, Joel will return to Chicago for another three weeks for classes in Congregational Life Studies, Religious Naturalism and Spiritual Practices. Joel is looking to start a Focused Initiative here at CUUF – which will involve "crossing borders" and possibly some storytelling. More details to come!!!

CUUF Ministerial Sabbatical Update

Rev. Laura is going on sabbatical from December 25, 2019, returning to the congregation in mid-April, and joining worship with us on Sunday May 10, 2020. The purpose of a ministerial sabbatical is for a minister to have relief from the daily work of ministering to the congregation and to have opportunities for reflection, growth and then re-engagement. The congregation will continue to pay Rev. Laura's salary and benefits during this time away. The CUUF Ministerial Sabbatical Leadership Team is working on a grant application from the Lily Endowment to support not only Rev. Laura's activities during her sabbatical including education and travel, but also to support the congregation's financial needs for ministerial support during this time. The grant can also provide financial support for Rev. Laura and the congregation to work through the transition when she returns. This financial support and the congregation's engagement will help both Rev. Laura and the congregation to take full advantage of this extraordinary opportunity for focused reflection and supported growth.

The CUUF Ministerial Sabbatical Leadership Team will also be working with the congregation to ensure we meet our own goals for this sabbatical — to refresh ourselves, to grow and then re-engage with our minister as we enter into a new era of shared ministry. We will formally send her off with blessings in December and celebrate the blessings she brings back to us in May. Members of the CUUF Ministerial Sabbatical Leadership Team supporting Rev. RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

From the Desk of the DRE

Spring arrives in less than a month...at least by the calendar. It's hard to believe that as I write this, with more than a foot of snow sitting outside my window, more coming down, and icicles dangling from the eaves. But I know it will happen, and likely it will change quickly, and suddenly, perhaps in one weekend and we will be outside taking deep, full breaths of that fresh air with a hint of warmth, and new growth.

Does anyone else remember the scene in the Disney movie, "Bambi" when one of the characters was explaining what happens in the spring when all the animals start falling in love, and become "twitterpated?"

It seems as good a month as any to have the focus in Youth Group be about healthy relationships, dating and consent. We'll begin the month watching the documentary, Miss Representation - the counterpart to the film we watched in January that explored the narrow definition our culture allows boys and men, and toxic masculinity. Miss Representation focuses on "how mainstream media contributes to the under-representation of women in influential positions by circulating limited and often disparaging portrayals of women. The film interweaves stories from teenage girls with provocative interviews to give an inside look at the media and its message. The film's motto, "You can't be what you can't see," underscores an implicit message that young women need and want positive role models, and that the media has thus far neglected its unique opportunity to provide them." In the K-5th Grade class we will be sharing our gifts with each other. Learning what our gifts are, what they can be, looking beyond what is commonly seen to what is the truth of each and every individual and the gifts we all carry.

Remember, this is a month of transition. Changing of seasons can be challenging so remember to breathe, slow down, look for ways to create balance that is natural in the coming Equinox. As you enjoy your hot cuppa, notice how it balances the cold outside. As you sit quietly for a few moments, notice how it balances the happy chaos of the kids playing in the other room (or right next to you!). 

Meho and Daiko at January 2019 Three Day Sesshin

Dogen Zenji and Time Sharon Meho Petit and Todd Daiko Petit

On a Zen teacher's Facebook group I came across a quote from Dogen Zenji, the founder of the Soto Zen sect and one of my own Zen ancestors. It goes like this: "We think of old age as something that happens to us. But..we are time itself."

Having just presented the Four Noble Truths to the students of the Living Zen Class at the college and... turning 70 last year this quote really struck home with me. When we look at what we call ourselves we can see that we change over time and there is nothing solid and unchanging we can attach to as self. But this takes it to the next step, seeing we are an expression of time itself. Wow! Time is not outside of ourselves. Neither is the oxygen we breathe or the green Earth that we stand on. We also can see that the Earth itself is time, the Cosmos is time. And, getting back to the Four Noble Truths, we are all impermanent and of the nature to become sick, grow old and die. Nothing to be done and any attempt to avoid or not acknowledge this fundamental truth will cause endless suffering for ourselves and everyone else.

This is very simple but oh how we resist.


Unitarian Universalism

- * A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- * The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- * The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- * Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

Unitarian Universalism draws from many sources:

- * Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- * Words and deeds of prophetic women and men which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- * Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- * Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- * Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit.
- * Spiritual teachings of earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
