
A MESSAGE FROM REV. LAURA SHENNUM



Dear Congregation,



Message from our Intern Minister

You may have already heard about the Severe Weather Response Network. CUUF is working alongside the Women's Resource Center and other local partners to provide overnight shelter for those without homes during the coldest months of the year. Last year, three people died from exposure in our valley, and that doesn't count those that exposure was only a contributing factor in their death.

The SWRN committee found a strong template many communities in the Pacific Northwest have used for this type of project out of Washington County,



This year, we have a goal to have three shelters open this winter and to serve at least 50 people. We have two committed shelters already. Holy Apostles will serve as a shelter for men, while the YWCA will serve as a shelter for women and women with children.

The group also targeted teenagers as another group that has a need in our valley and has few to no service options available due to the way "homelessness" is defined by the State of Washington Commerce Department and the City of Wenatchee. I would like to ask that CUUF serve as a shelter for teens this winter as part of the severe weather response network.

East Wenatchee Fire Department will allow us to be open for a 90-day window, which we are targeting for Dec. 1, 2019, through Feb. 29, 2020. While it hasn't been written yet, the task force has signaled they will support us being open seven days per week during the window, regardless of the weather.

What would this require from CUUF:

- ♦ Open our doors approximately 8 p.m. to 9 p.m. All guests leave approximately 7 a.m. to 8 a.m.
- ♦ Set-up and clean-up support daily
- ♦ Three volunteers on site at all times for teens, two awake and one can be asleep (adults or children with their parent/guardian require only two volunteers on site)
- ♦ Meal support for daily breakfast and dinner (premade meals brought from home or sandwich and cereal ingredient donations)
- ♦ Community advocates to explain what will happen to our nearby neighbors
- ♦ Other donation support

While the city has given us funds, we are looking to have at least one staff person hired to serve as a volunteer coordinator, and possibly a small team. The team will look to fill in the gaps of the air mattresses, bed linens, hygiene products, etc. that do not come in from donation with some of those city funds.

The practice of pulling our attention back and allowing ourselves time to experience the moment, to live in the now, opens us up to the miraculous, spiritual, graceful, and grateful nature of present. This is what I hope most to instill.

With the somewhat chaotic spirit of many of our children, parents and children alike would benefit from children who have learned to ease themselves, and simply experience what surrounds them. Whether it's breathing exercises, or simply paying attention to the depth of details within any mundane object, we aim to gain appreciation through attention. In addition, the theme of attention to the needs of others is crucial. It goes without saying how important fostering empathy in our youth is. Healthy communities are born out of altruism and unconditional care. Our attention this month is directed toward the benefit of ourselves and by extension, others.

Does the congregation direct the board to select a local architectural firm to prepare a detail design of the proposed new building and associated site plan (driveways, parking, etc.) utilizing the current best information regarding the proposed taking of CUUF land resulting from the Sunset Highway improvement project? It is understood by the Fellowship that should there be meaningful changes in the amount of land impacted by



the Highway project, revisions to this design may be necessary. The actual cost will be approved by the Board of Trustees. If cost were to exceed \$80,000, then it will be brought back to the congregation.

"The SPC of NCW was formed in response to the rising suicide rate in the early months of 2012. The previous two years were record years for the Chelan/Douglas counties and we are hopeful to have an impact in reducing this trend. Our ultimate goal is to have a zero tolerance for completed suicides in our community (East Wenatchee, Wenatchee, Chelan, other) and to spread the word that help is available and things really do get better.

"Suicide improves when those feeling suicidal are not afraid of talking about it; when others are not afraid to ask the direct questions and have the difficult conversations. Asking someone about suicide will not cause them to kill themselves."

In Case 19 of the *Gateless Gate* koan collection, the revered ancestral Zen teacher, Joshu, asked his teacher, Nansen, *What is the Way?* Nansen answered, *If you try for it, you will become separated from it.* Joshu persisted, *How can I know the Way unless I try for it?* Nansen, *The Way is not a matter of knowing or not knowing. Knowing is delusion; not knowing is confusion. When you have reached the true Way beyond doubt, you will find it as vast and boundless as outer space. How can it be talked about on the level of right or wrong?*

We all try to reach for the unknowable with this wonderful complex mind that is our heritage as human beings. But we have the mindset illustrated in the old saying, beyond here be dragons. So, we like to set up these false arguments in our own heads. This is right, is that wrong? But true wisdom does not come from these misguided arguments, but in sitting long and getting tired like I did recently in the Autumn Sesshin at Chobo-Ji with Genjo Marinello Roshi and my two students, Jeff Lau and Allyssa Tsukisetsu Arnold. Eventually you drop your arguments with yourself and just open to the wonder that is Life. And you begin to understand that Life is nowhere but right here right now. In that way we return to our True Home in Ordinary Mind. But this Ordinary Mind is not the ordinary mind that is our biological brain, rather this is the Mind that opens to the endless karmic ripples throughout space-time. We look at our beautiful but small Buddha purchased over ten years ago and understand why our teachers have said repeatedly, You need a bigger Buddha. Then an old CUUF friend calls and says, I hear you need a bigger Buddha. I have one. Would you like it? Then you see it and the sangha says, Now, that is a Bigger Buddha! Or as Rick Muken Proctor says, Now, that is the Big Dude!

The ordinary mind of the Way is the one we share with every human being, animal, rock and star. It is the intimate connection that notices our needs, pain and joy. It is where we notice the needs and celebrations of all of Life right here in this moment and if we have a Bigger Buddha and a sangha needs it, we pass it on. Much thanks to Maria Reister who passed on her friend, Jaqueline Jackie Van Assen's, beautiful Buddha.


Unitarian Universalism
